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1. What this factsheet is about



Millions of people have problems communicating.

For example, people with

- autism
- a brain injury
- learning disabilities.



You might find it hard to speak.

Or you might find it hard to understand what people are saying.



But there are lots of things to help you communicate more easily.

We call them Communication Aids.



This factsheet tells you about **electronic** Communication Aids that can help you.



A Communication Aid is **electronic** when it uses a battery or needs to be plugged in.



Choosing the right Communication Aid is important.

It will depend on

- · what you need
- what you like
- what you can do.



We think it is important that you have an assessment with a Speech and Language Therapist.

Speech and Language Therapists help people to learn ways to communicate.



An assessment is when the Speech and Language Therapist meets you and finds out how they can help you.

They can help you choose what Communication Aids you need.



It is also important that your family and carers learn how to communicate with you.

You can ask them to come to your assessment with you.

2. Ways to help you communicate



If you find it hard to speak or write there are lots of Communication Aids to help you.



Communication Aids can be electronic.

This is when they use batteries or needs to be plugged in.



Communication Aids can be

a device you can hold



an app on a smartphone



software on a tablet or computer.





Software is what makes a computer do useful things.

For example, if you want to type a letter on a computer, you can use Microsoft Word.



You might need Communication Aids for only a short time.

Or you might need them all of your life.



You can use Communication Aids on computers to help you speak and write.



For example, your computer could say a symbol or picture out loud to help you communicate and understand.

3. Communication Aids that speak out loud



You can get Communication Aids that can speak words or sentences out loud that you want to say.



The voice is a computer voice.

But it is easy to understand.



There are lots of different ways that you can control these Communication Aids.



For example you can

- press a button or use a touch screen
- flip a switch
- type text.



Some of these devices are light and you can hold them in your hand.




Others can go on a desk or on a wheelchair.

Devices that use a button



Lots of devices are controlled by pressing symbols on buttons to make them talk.



Some devices can only say a few words.

Some devices can say lots of different things.



Here are some devices that you can hold in your hands

- The Quicktalker
- Gotalk.



Here are some devices that go on desks or wheelchairs

- Bigmack
- Gotalk 20 Plus.



Some devices are controlled by using a **touchscreen**.

A touchscreen is a screen on a device that you can control by touching it.

For example, tablets have touchscreens.



With devices that use a touchscreen you can change the screen display to what you want.



Here are some touchscreen devices that you can hold in your hand



- Gotalk Express 32
- Liberator Rugged 7.



Some touchscreen devices can help you do lots more things.

But these touchscreen devices cost more money.



For example, you can use them to

- send emails
- control your TV



- go on social media
- make phone calls
- listen to music.



Here are some touchscreen devices that can do these things

- Tellus Mobi 2
- Indi.

Devices that use text



Some devices are controlled by typing text.



You do this by typing on a keyboard or touchscreen.



Here are some devices that are controlled by text

- TTS 100
- Allora 2.

4. Software and apps




You can use special **software** on a computer to help you communicate more easily.

Software is what makes a computer do useful things.



You can also use special apps on your tablet or smartphone that help you to communicate.


